Norbert Capek was born on June 3, 1870 in Bohemia. After a Roman Catholic childhood and early career as a Baptist minister, he converted to Unitarianism and became one of its leaders. During World War II he was imprisoned by the Germans and murdered at Dachau for speaking out against the Nazis. Capek devised the Flower Communion, now widely used in Unitarian Universalist churches, saying it showed that even in the worst times, we can still share beauty.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES COUNCIL NEWS and NOTES

Summer Services, beginning Sunday, June 7th and continuing through the end of July, will start at 9:30 a.m.

What's the same? Services will be varied and of high quality. The order of service is similar. Each Sunday we will have a greeter, worship associate, accompanist and special music. We will welcome visitors, returning members and friends. Childcare will be available. Fellowship time will follow the service (about 10:30 a.m.). Worship associates will send out a weekly update with details about each Sunday's opportunities; do check these out. The Creative Spiritz team plans a special summer installation for the north and east walls.

What's different? Summer worship leaders are all lay-leaders mostly from our church, plus a couple of visitors: Ben Kieffer, son of Esther Kieffer and well-known to Iowa Public Radio enthusiasts, and Sam Wormley, Sunday Morning Program Committee co-chair of the UU Fellowship of Ames. UUSBHC-ers who have agreed to lead summer services are Deblyn Russell, Lara Martinsen-Burrell, Al Hays, Karen Impola, Bill Chene, Del Carpenter and Jim Paprocki. The service space will be rearranged to face west (latecomers are encouraged to enter by the east door). Service length is one hour or less. After the hospitality/fellowship time, some service leaders and worship associates will offer "Continue the Conversation"—an opportunity to dialogue about the service topic, with the starting time about 10:50 a.m., and discussion time forty-five minutes maximum. Summer outreach: Lara Martinsen-Burrell will lead worship at the UU Fellowship of Ames on July 19th, with *Lisa Kratz* as worship associate and general support.

A STEPBACK IN TIME...

The Waterloo-Cedar Falls Courier Insider—published on Wednesdays—carries a column, "Off The Record", written by long-time Cedar Falls resident, Barbara Gray. Each week Barbara researches Cedar Falls Record newspapers from fifty years ago for her column and puts together an assortment of brief articles that appeared in the Record at that time (this year she's focusing on 1959). In the April 22, 2009 Insider, here was one article that caught my eye.

"Price Laboratory School was offering a special English course from June 15th to August 7th. It would be taught by Howard Vanderbeek, associate professor of teaching, and Dr. John Cowley, professor of language, speech and literature. The course was limited to fifty students from the area who had completed their junior year in high school and were in the upper quarter of their class. A recommendation by their English teacher also was necessary. Topics to be covered were semantics, story organization and development, and the analysis of poetry, fiction and drama."

As many of you know, in 1950 *Dr. John Cowley* and his wife, *Helen*, were two of the founding members of the Unitarian Fellowship here in Cedar Falls. John was our Lay Minister for many years before we had professional leadership and Helen served in numerous capacities on the Board, including President, and with the R.E. program. John and Helen were a joy to know. One of the upstairs classrooms is named for the Cowleys.

The Bull's Blood beets the children planted are up! Mystery Veggies are sprouting in the two pots near the east entrance. We expect to have some early garden produce to share in the next few weeks—displayed on the tables at the far end in the Fellowship Hall. As before, you are asked to leave a donation for vegetables or flowers you take home. This year the budget committee has requested that we contribute the first \$200 to the general budget to help the shortfall. This will also compensate for use of church resources to keep the garden project moving—water, seeds, tools, etc. All subsequent proceeds will once again be contributed to the Northeast Iowa Food Bank.

This year we ask that you come quickly to the produce table during coffee hour to select the items you want, put them in a bag with your name on it, and stow them for pick-up after second hour events. Those of us who help harvest and clean the veggies have to start early and may need to leave before second hour. All produce left after coffee hour will go directly to the Food Bank. We want to have recipe suggestions on the table each Sunday; that way you can pick up vegetables for your Sunday meal and have some new ideas of what to do with them.

Please take a peek at the garden to see what is already growing. We have had trouble getting our snow peas to germinate but still have hopes. Some of the tomatoes are blooming and all the cabbage family look swell. *Laura Walter* has secured more native prairie plants to extend our rain garden along the south lot line, so those will be planted soon. Beans, cukes, and peppers go in as soon as frost danger is past.

We were dismayed to lose so much of our east honeysuckle shrub border which screened between us and the mobile home park; however, the city has an easement there to channel parking lot run off into the storm drain and prevent it from pooling in the neighbor's backyard. The removal of those older shrubs, beautiful but also an invasive species, will give us the opportunity to plant something more natural and overall beneficial. We are working with the city on constructing a barrier to vehicles that might try to drive through the opened space.

We can still use help with upkeep of beds and yard, planting flowers, prairie plants, and cannas, and tending the garden table on Sunday. Children are welcome helpers.

Frank Lloyd Wright was born on June 8, 1867 in Richland Center, Wisconsin. Wright is considered by many to be America's foremost architect, championing what is known as the Prairie Style. He built 532 homes and other buildings including Unity Temple (Universalist) in Oak Park, Illinois; the Imperial Hotel in Tokyo; the Guggenheim Museum in New York City; and the First Unitarian Society of Madison, Wisconsin where he was an active member.



WEDNESDAY DINNERS ~ HELPERS WANTED

Thank you to *everyone* who helped with Wednesday dinners during the school year!

How do you get involved? <u>Pick a date</u>. Since you are doing the work, you do not pay for yourself on that day.

<u>Decide</u> if you are going to do it yourself or ask someone to help you (this is the most fun).

<u>Set-up</u> includes putting out the plates and silverware, putting water in the hot water pot and plugging it in. Get out the bread, peanut butter and jelly and salad dressings (all in the fridge), cups, glasses, put water and ice in pitchers, put out the basket for the money (I'll collect it), the sign and book (on the pink table by the back door).

<u>Prepare</u> the main dishes (usually a meat and vegetable), salad or soup, and dessert. Keep your receipts (and give to me) so you will be reimbursed. The soup can be one of the main dishes—either veggie or meat. If you are a vegetarian or vegan feel free to ask someone to bring the meat dish or vice versa.

<u>Clean-up</u> involves opening the dishwasher so people load their own dishes, put everything away, finish filling dishwasher, wash other dishes that won't fit. Vacuum the floor, can use non-electric if it's not too bad. Wipe off tables. Take the garbage to the garbage can then take the can out to the street.






SUMMER FUN GROUP -- Art and Games
